Zion Baptist Church in Cincinnati, OH is prayerfully seeking a new pastor to lead our congregation and the Pastoral Search Committee is in prayer seeking God's guidance in this process.

Zion Baptist Church is a loving, family-oriented congregation, located in the Avondale neighborhood, a predominately African American urban community in Cincinnati. She has been a part of the Cincinnati community for 179 years and is still serving God's people. She is surrounded by good schools, two outstanding universities (University of Cincinnati, Xavier University), and a world class hospital (Children's Hospital, rated number 3 in the country). The city has a vibrant arts community, the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center, three professional sports teams and many beautiful parks.

Zion is a member of American Baptist Churches, USA and Progressive National Baptist Convention which was founded in 1961 at Zion under the pastorate of the late Rev. Dr. L. Venchael Booth. During that same period (1964), the Rev. Dr. Martin L. King spoke at Zion for her 122nd Anniversary Celebration. For her 179th Anniversary Celebration, the Rev. Dr. Julius R. Scruggs, past president National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc. was the speaker. Zion has a rich heritage, and we look forward to working with our next pastor. May the Lord bind us together to do the work of His kingdom.

## **OUR GUIDING PRINCIPLES AND BELIEFS**

### **The Church Covenant**

The Church Covenant outlines our commitment to one another as a Body of Christ. The covenant is available in our church hymnals and our constitution. The congregation reads the covenant on the first Sunday of each month when we celebrate communion.



### **The Church Constitution**

The Zion Church Constitution sets forth the basic principles that prescribe the nature, functions, and operational limits of the church. The Preamble to this document states: "We declare and establish this constitution to secure the principles of our faith as practiced in Missionary Baptist Churches and to govern the body in an orderly manner. This constitution will preserve the liberties of each individual church member and the freedom of the sovereign body."

### **Our Mission**

To advance the kingdom of God as revealed through the Word of God and through the life, ministry, and teachings of Jesus Christ. To seek to attain this end through public worship of God, the preaching of the Gospel, consistent Christian living by its members, personal evangelism, missionary endeavors, Christian education, and the support of worthy causes consistent with the word, teachings, and ministry of Jesus Christ.



### **Statement Of Faith**

We believe in one Lord, one faith, and one baptism. The Holy Bible is the inspired word of God, and it is the basis for any statement of faith; we band ourselves together as a body of baptized believers in Jesus Christ personally and cooperatively committed to sharing the good news of salvation to lost mankind. The ordinances of this church are baptism and the Lord's supper.


### Relationship





## A GLIMPSE OF ZION'S HISTORY

Zion Baptist Church is Cincinnati's second oldest African American Baptist congregation. Under the leadership of her founder, Reverend Wallace Shelton, Zion was organized in 1842. The first church was located on Plum Street and from this location became active in the Underground Railroad System which aided fugitive slaves. This pioneer group built the first brick church owned by African Americans in the city in 1867. Rev. Shelton established many churches in and beyond Cincinnati, leading Zion to be known throughout the country as "Big Zion."

Following Reverend Shelton's pastorate, Zion had a series of pastors whose tenures were minimal.

The tenures of most of the subsequent pastors were longer. Under their leadership, significant strides were made.

Wheeler, Ph.D. (1985-1991)</li> <li>Revived and reenergized church membership; membership grew to 850 persons.</li> <li>Implemented the Church Council.</li> <li>Started the Feed the Hungry and the Bag Lunch ministries.</li> <li>Involved the church in outreach efforts to assist the Avondale Food Pantry and the Winton Terrace Guild.</li> </ul>

### **ZION 2022**

Presently, Zion has 134 active members who participate in church activities and contribute to the church financially. Zion has one worship service held on site each Sunday at 10:30 a.m. Services are available on Facebook and by phone for remote worshippers. We serve communion on the first Sunday of the month. Sunday School meets Sundays at 9:15 a.m. on site and virtually and at 6 p.m. on Zoom. Bible study classes and discipleship groups meet throughout the week. The church staff includes an office manager, minister of music, and two part-time custodians. The church celebrates Easter, Christmas, Church and Pastor Anniversaries, Black History Month, Family and Friends Day, and the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. (MLK) Interfaith Vesper. On the following pages, you will find an outline of the organizations and structures through which Zion provides for the spiritual needs of her people and a demographic breakdown of the congregation and community.

#### ZION'S STRENGTHS

Zion's greatest strength is the love and dedication that her members share with each other, the church, and the community. Seniors are our largest age group, and they are deeply committed to Christ and Zion. The shutdown demonstrated this—giving levels did not change during that time because members made sure to send their offerings by mail or electronically. Members cite the various church-based prayer opportunities, the benevolence fund for the needy, and outreach efforts of the Missions Ministry and Sunday School as ways that Zion shows her love. Biblical teaching provided in the Sunday School, Bible Study classes, and discipleship groups is strong. Zion's boards— Deacons, Trustees, Board of Christian Education—continue to provide functional and effective leadership. Many of our ministries are viable and have embraced new communications technology so they can operate virtually and in person. The Music Ministry is very strong and inspiring. The minister of music is nationally recognized for his excellence.


### **ZION'S CHALLENGES**

Zion also has challenges. Her membership has decreased and needs restoration. Like many American churches, we have a dwindling number of people to support all the ministry we do. We struggle to make meaningful connections with new people, especially those under 50. We need to bring more young families with children to Christ. Our beautiful but aging edifice needs proper attention to meet contemporary needs. Our members share the safety-related anxiety of many American churchgoers—anxiety related to Covid, crime, mobility and travel of our seniors, and gun violence. Above all, Zion needs to ensure that her worship service inspires and reflects her vision to exalt God and welcome all. Zion needs a short-term and a long-term strategic plan for addressing these challenges. We need a leader with vision to help create and implement those plans.





## ZION'S ORGANIZATION AND STRUCTURE
